Long-term sequencing Year 10 GCSE

INTENT: The curriculum for this stage of students' education has been designed to engage and encourage students to become confident artists and designers. Whilst the structure of the course is dictated by the Edexcel Art, Craft and Design specification, we have built in as much opportunity as possible for students to do be proactive in choosing their topic, influences and choice of media. They will complete a mock coursework unit, designed to further refine their skills base and reaffirm how they will be expected to structure their coursework before starting on the required NEA Portfolio Task, which is worth 60% of their final GCSE grade. It is designed to increase their proficiency in the handling of different media, build confidence and independence developing their own ideas and style, further extend their range of subject specific vocabulary enabling them to confidently analyse and evaluate both their own work, and that of others, in order to observe closely, think critically and discuss respectfully. This unit will continue into Year 11, where they will also complete an Externally Set Assignment culminating in a 10- hour final examination, which is worth 40% of their final GCSE grade. Students will emerge with a toolkit of transferable skills, applicable to both further studies and the workplace.

HALF TERM 1, 2 and 3: NEA 1

The topic for this unit of work is decided by the art teachers and changes annually depending on the cohort and current social issues which may be relevant, whilst giving the students greater autonomy over the direction of their work.

The aim of this unit is to encourage students to develop knowledge, skills, and understanding along with creativity and imagination. It provides an opportunity for students to experiment and take risks with their work whilst developing their own style. It enables students to develop critical understanding through investigative, analytical, experimental, practical, technical and expressive skills. To develop and refine ideas and proposals, personal outcomes or solutions with increasing independence. To acquire and develop technical skills through working with a broad range of media, materials, techniques, processes and technologies with purpose and intent.

Self and peer assessment opportunities and informal verbal feedback. Summative assessment (using the OCR Portfolio Task Assessment Grid) – the project as a whole

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HALF TERM 4, 5 and 6: NEA1, portfolio, NEA2,external set task.

Students will be given a choice of two topic titles (written collaboratively by the art teacher) – they are to select one and produce a body of work over the next terms which will be submitted as their NEA 1, Portfolio Task.

It provides an opportunity for students to experiment and take risks with their work whilst developing their own style. It enables students to develop critical understanding through investigative, analytical, experimental, practical, technical and expressive skills. To acquire and develop technical skills through working with a broad range of media, materials, techniques, processes and technologies with purpose and intent.

This unit of work will include a 3 hour exam piece in Year 10 where students will then revisit and review the work for a final 5-hour piece in December Year 11 – In January Year 11 they are set an external task by the exam board. Which will take 12 week with a final piece of work completed in a 10-hour exam.

STUDENTS MUST KNOW:

- how to produce sensitive, skilful and accurate observed drawings of skulls from first hand and secondary sources (AO3).
- how to analyse (visual and written) and critically evaluate the work of artists relevant to the chosen topic (AO1).
- how to experiment with a range of materials and techniques, refining and developing their skills; use the techniques of artists and practitioners to inform their experiments (AO2).
- how to evaluate their own work and use this to inform their next steps (AO1).
- how to develop and produce a sophisticated final piece that combines all aspects of their research and experimentation (AO4).

THIS WILL BE ASSESSED: Formal assessment based on observational drawing skills; competent written and visual analysis of artists using relevant subject specific vocabulary; final piece – mixed media. Self and peer assessment opportunities and informal verbal feedback. Summative assessment (using the Pearson Edexcel Task Assessment Grid) – the project as a whole. Externally moderated.

Home learning set will consist of a combination of: Artist research and completing work from previous lessons as well as photography.
