Art Department Long-term sequencing Year 8



INTENT: The curriculum for this stage of students' education has been designed to be inclusive for all and build on the knowledge gained in KS2 and Year 7 where students should have produced creative work becoming increasingly proficient in drawing and painting. The aim is to increase their skill in the handling of different media and their confidence to develop their own ideas and style; to extend their range of subject specific vocabulary enabling them to competently analyse and evaluate their own work, and that of others, in order to observe closely, think critically and discuss respectfully. Students will acquire skills that can be applied to cross-curricular topics, allowing them to reflect on and explore topics in greater depth. This should foster a love of the art, its application across the whole curriculum and increase awareness of vocations utilising art skills.

 HALF TERM 4: PORTRAITS Portraits can tell us about how we see people. They often show us what a person looks like, but can also capture an idea of a person or what they stand for. Portraits can tell us how a person wants to be seen, and capture a particular mood that the sitter is experiencing. Many students benefit from completing a self-portrait not just because of the chance to practice technical artistic skills, but the chance to engage in self-reflection. Art like this creates a statement about identity, personality, and perspective.
