## **HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE**

Welcome to this week's newsletter. and apologies for the late publication. It has been a rather busy week followed by a busy weekend dealing with the issues arising from the increase in the number of positive cases of COVID in the local area. Within the body of the school we are thankful that the number of cases remains low, but what is apparent is that the rate of contact and therefore the need to selfisolate has increased. Please be assured that we are not alone, I understand that almost two-thirds of Secondary Schools are experiencing disruptions at present and the number of students self-isolating nationally has doubled. Can I thank you for your understanding and cooperation on this.

The image to the right, of Pope Francis and his words of wisdom, strikes a huge chord with me at this time. In difficult moments I feel our Lord walking beside me and indeed sometimes carrying me through. Pope Francis uses the imagery of shepherds a lot in his preaching. This imagery is peppered throughout the bible and we as Catholics think of our Lord very much as a shepherd and we as His sheep. In his preaching, Pope Francis says that the Shepherd should smell of his flock. In other words, a Shepherd should live so closely with his flock and know them so well that he becomes one with them. 

#### **GCSEPOD**

One of the best things about GCSEPod is that you can download any Pod to your child's mobile device, and then they can watch them at any time, in any place, without internet. It's like they're carrying a whole set of textbooks in their pocket!

Make sure you download the GCSEPod app from the App Store (Apple and Android are supported) to access this feature. GCSEPod also has the ability to identify knowledge gaps and automatically send playlists to help fill them. After completing any homework set on GCSEPod, your child will get a personalised "Boost Playlist" of Pods relevant to their identified areas of weakness. We strongly suggest you encourage your child to review these playlists regularly as this will speed up their progress.

We recommend that you talk about GCSEPod with your son or daughter – check that they've successfully activated their account and encourage them to make use of this amazing resource throughout their GCSEs. Once they've activated their account, they can browse the GCSEPod library and create their own playlists – just as they would when they're listening to music.

From next week, we will start to tally students' access to GCSEPod. This will create the GCSEPod league, with chances for students to win prizes in recognition of their efforts.







Diwali – What's it all about?
The weekend saw many of our friends and family celebrate Diwali and we are happy to share a little bit about a festival that is so special for many in our community.

Diwali is an important religious festival originating in India. People often think of Diwali as a Hindu festival, but it is also celebrated by Sikhs and Jains. Diwali takes place annually and lasts for five days, marking the start of the Hindu New Year. The exact dates change each year and are determined by the position of the moon– but it usually falls between October and November.

The word Diwali (or Deepavali as it's sometimes called) means "row of lights" in an Ancient language of India, called Sanskrit. During this festival, people decorate their homes with lights and oil lamps, called diyas. But it's not just about lights and legends — Diwali is a time to have fun with friends and family! People exchange gifts and sweets, enjoy delicious feasts, watch firework displays and wear new clothes. It's a time to clean and decorate your home, too.



Rangoli is a popular Diwali tradition — beautiful patterns made using colourful powders and flowers. People draw rangoli on the floor by the entrance of their homes to bring good luck!

Today, this fascinating festival is celebrated by thousands of people in countries all around the world. During Diwali, Hindus living outside India gather at places of worship called mandirs to leave offerings, watch firework displays and eat yummy food together!

The city of Leicester, holds the largest Diwali celebrations outside of India. Every year, tens of thousands of people gather in the streets to enjoy vibrant shows of light, music and dancing!
