# A LOOK BACK AT OUR MAMMOTH HIKING FUNDRAISER.

On Thursday 3rd June, the team (Mr Steele, Mr Walker, Miss Raindi, Mrs Bates, Mr Pepper, Mr Drury) headed up to Fort William to take on the Three Peaks Challenge. They were supported by Mrs Morris and Mrs Davies who offered to drive and give them general TLC along the way.

After they arrived, they were all looking forward to their pre-walk meal, until Mr Walker realised that it was June and the reservation had been made for 3rd July! Luckily, he worked his charm to convince the pub to let them in anyway. Due to the excitement, a few of them didn't manage to get much beauty sleep before they set off at 3.30pm on their first hike up Ben Nevis, the highest of the peaks at 1345 metres. They left their invaluable support crew napping at the bottom and the team nervously started out.

Unsure as to the best tactics to attack the mountain, they turned to the most experienced member of the team who gave this useful advice: "just put one foot in front of the other, again and again."

Ben Nevis was by far the hardest of all the peaks. Towards the top, there was next to no visibility, with snow and ice covering the paths and so they had to rely on GPS tracking to reach the summit. This cost them valuable time and it was nearly 6 hours after they started that they reached the foot of mountain again. All the team were suffering with cramp, tiredness and exhaustion. However, they still celebrated their climb and were determined to carry on and succeed.

Their next stop was the Lake District, arriving at Scafell Pike - the third highest peak at 978 metres, at roughly 4.30am. Most of the team had tried to catch up on some sleep in the bus, but for some this was very difficult.

The weather was definitely on their side and as they climbed, the sun rose high above the summit. The route to the top was very rocky and technical and all had to be careful where to place their feet. At one point, there was an amazing cloud inversion beneath them in the valley – a motivational sight to see. This spurred them on to reach the top and enjoy the spectacular views of the entire Lake District. It was much harder on the legs to descend Scafell than climb and so by the end the team's legs were very sore and they had a much needed rest on the bus to their next destination.

The journey out of the Lake District was incredibly difficult with narrow roads and tight bends. Mrs Morris showed her considerable driving skills to get the team out in one piece! Due to the time lost, the team knew they wouldn't make the 24 hour challenge and this was quite demotivating. However, as so many people had donated to the cause and supported the team with their messages, they knew they had to finish it, regardless of the time taken.

They arrived in Snowdonia and the second highest peak, Yr Wyddfa (Snowdon) towering at 1085 metres. The team split into two groups with Mr Steele and Mr Walker aiming to run as much of this mountain as they could to complete the challenge in as little time as possible.

The rest of the group set their own pace and still managed to complete all the peaks. Snowdon was another technical climb but also presented some stunning views until the clouds surrounded the team at roughly 600 metres. This made the rest of the ascent wet and slippery, but didn't slow the runners down too much.

Even though the team didn't complete the challenge in under 24 hours, the achievement of the whole group was incredible and will stay with each of them for a long time (almost as long as the pain in their legs!). They couldn't have done it without the support of everyone back at school who contributed financially, sent thoughtful messages to offer encouragement, and followed them on their epic journey. The total raised was £2536 and these funds will help support our most vulnerable families in our local community.




Here are some of the excellent examples of work produced by our KS3 students during the summer term.





### **CAREERS NEWS**

Careers, like most of the school year has been affected in some part due to the pandemic, however we have had some good things happen.

In KS3, our students have covered essential careers lessons as part of the citizenship and PSHE curriculum.

Our Year 9 students have had a week of guest speakers from different professional backgrounds talking about their jobs, offering words of advice, routes into the profession and where their employment can take them in the future. We had speakers from the fields of engineering, medical, education, technology, and business.

Year 10 and 9 have had a motivational session by the inspirational Stephen Sekki. This helped the students to reengage into the classroom environment and focus their energy to performing well in their subjects.

KS4 and 5 students have taken part in numerous virtual work experiences during their own time following links we have provided.

We also had many students attend the Black Country Virtual Careers Fair which was set up by the Careers and Enterprise Company. Students valued these sessions and would recommend them in the future.

All of our Year 11 students have had 1-1 interview sessions to support their progress post-KS4, whether that is staying on with us in sixth form or moving on to pastures new in further education or apprenticeships.

Last year's 11 cohort (2020) were all successful in gaining a future position along these routes, and our careers team will be working hard to continue to support our new Year 11s in securing positions.

Our students have developed some valuable independent skills during this difficult COVID pandemic.
We have been through 3 separate lockdowns, and bubble closures where students have studied independently and online and as a result all have upskilled themselves in IT.
All on their own.

Nobody in recent history has had to go through what you have, and you have all come through it with better skills and personal qualities. And I would like to congratulate you all for the progress you have made.


