## **GCSEPOD** School-wide success with online revision resources.



The latter part of the Spring Term has seen the explosive launch of GCSEPod at Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School with Key Stage 4 students storming the regional league tables and taking us to 2nd place out of over 100 schools through their 'podding.' For those unfamiliar with the software, GCSEPod is an online programme that provides access to short video clips or 'pods' linked to their learning in a range of subjects. Students can watch the pods to support with their revision of in-class work, help them com-

plete their homework and complete booster questions to consolidate their work too. The software has proved to be a great success with

a phenomenal 12,000 pods streamed in less than a month!

A competitive streak amongst our students and staff has also been unravelled as subject areas compete to be top 'podding' departments. Currently, the superb Science team hold the title of the highest podding department, with English coming a close second.
