Never give up.



SAFEGUARDING

My name is Mr Willett, and I am the proud Designated Safeguarding Lead at Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School. Keeping your children safe is our single highest priority as a school, and all staff work collaboratively to achieve this.

I have responsibility to ensure all staff are trained to spot any indicators of concern, and I will then take appropriate actions to ensure the safety of every child, taking a child-centered approach.

I will act as a single point of contact for all parents if you need guidance or advice or have any concerns. I work closely with a wide range of agencies who can provide additional support if required. We have a range of interventions available to support you and your family; some that we provide in school, and some to whom we refer when bringing in specialist support.

This week, your children will have received emergency procedure training. It is vital that all students are clear on what they would need to do in the event of an emergency situation, understanding their roles and working in collaboration with staff to keep safe.



On Friday 10th September, Stuart
Bathurst will be supporting the 'World
Suicide Prevention Day'. Students
have taken part in activities this
Friday during their tutor time to raise
awareness of suicide, and also provide
clear guidance of how to get help
in school, and also out of school, if
they have any concerns. One in every
100 deaths worldwide is the result of
suicide. It can affect every one of us.

Each and every suicide is devastating and has a profound impact on those around them. However, by raising awareness, reducing the stigma around suicide and encouraging well-informed action, we can reduce instances of suicide around the world.

STANDARDS & UNIFORM

Dear Parents / Carers,

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you back this academic year and hope that you and your loved ones had a restful summer. As a pastoral team we are looking forward to supporting you and your child transitioning back into more familiar school routines this academic year.

As a school community, we have high expectations that permeate all aspects of school life. This includes the education we offer our students, our parent-school relationships, and our students themselves.

The high expectations that we have in our students extend beyond their academic performance and includes developing the whole child. An example of this is the high expectations in behaviour both inside and outside of the lesson.

The start of the academic year is often a time where new uniform is purchased. It is important that this uniform is in line with standards expected at Stuart Bathurst so please consult the Stuart Bathurst Uniform Policy – a summary of the main items of uniform can be seen in the table.

If an item of uniform is not in line with the school policy, the student will be be placed in internal inclusion whilst the issue is being resolved.

An important aspect in a child reaching their potential, is an attendance that is as high as possible. Please inform the school of any absence via the school number. This will not only help the school to support you and your child ,but also focus their attention on unexplained absences.

PSHE PROVISION

PSHE stands for Personal, Social, Health, and Economic education.

The aim of the PSHE programme at Stuart Bathurst, is to enable and encourage our all of our pupils to acquire the skills, understanding and key knowledge they need to thrive as individuals in all aspects of their life, and to become active and responsible citizens who contribute to our society.

At the centre of all that we do as a faith community, is the understanding that each human person is made in the image and likeness of God. Our curriculum therefore, underpins the Catholic ethos and Mission of the School and is a catalyst for the School's principle role of teaching our pupils to grow and flourish as responsible individuals in our society.

RELATIONSHIPS, SEX AND HEALTH EDUCATION UPDATE

In the academic year 2021-2022, Relationships, Sex and Health Education has become statutory in all secondary schools in England. This new subject will build on the nonstatutory lessons we have previously taught in RSHE.

As a Catholic school, our mission is to support the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of all of our pupils, rooted in the wisdom and teaching of the Church. The education of children in human sexuality is an important, precious and privileged responsibility. The Church teaches us that this is very much a partnership with parents, in which parents are the 'first educators' of their children on these matters; ultimately, you confer on us the right to co-educate your children with you.

We have been researching various programmes that are available and have decided to adopt 'Life to the Full' by Ten-Ten Resources. Ten-Ten is an award-winning Catholic educational organisation that is well-respected and very experienced in this field of work.

'Life to the Full' has been approved by our diocese. Furthermore, Ten-Ten have entered into a partnership with the Catholic Education Service and the Department for Education to provide training for teachers in Catholic schools on the subject of the new statutory curriculum. Therefore, we are confident that this programme is a very good fit for our school.

Through their programme, Ten-Ten understand the foundational role that parents have in educating and nurturing their children on these matters. Within the programme, they have built in resources which will not only keep you informed about what is being taught in school, but will also give you the opportunity to engage your children in discussion, activity and prayer.

Ten-Ten have provided an online Parent Consultation Tool. This is a simple-to-follow, short online course which:

- Outlines the statutory changes that will take place.
- Articulates a vision for Catholic Relationships and Health Education.
- Explains how 'Life to the Full' aims to help us fulfil the statutory curriculum with a Catholic ethos.
- Provides some information about key decisions we need to make, in consultation with parents.
- Answers some Frequently Asked Questions.

Ten-Ten have also provided an Online Parent Portal which will be a tool we can use throughout the year to keep you informed and updated about the work we are doing in school.

ASSESSMENT WEEKS

THE PURPOSE OF ASSESSMENT

Assessment informs teaching and learning, identifies students' areas of strength, and areas of development, and also provides opportunities for all pupils to practice and prepare for external exams at the end of KS4 and KS5.

WHAT WILL BE ASSESSED?

Assessments in all subject areas will follow the content that the pupils are being taught during the school term. Subject teachers will inform the pupils what will be assessed and how best to prepare. They will also provide resources that pupils can use to aid their revision.

SCHEDULE OF ASSESSMENT

Our Assessment Calendar has been planned in advance to enable you to support your child throughout the school year as they complete their assessments.

In KS3, all year groups have three Assessment Week (AW) points timetabled throughout the school Year.

In KS4, Year 10 have two Assessment Weeks (one of which will be Core mock exams) and then a full set Mock Examinations. Year 11 have one Assessment Week and then a full set of Mock Examinations. In KS5, Year 12 have two Assessment Weeks and then a full set of Mock Examinations. Year 13 have one Assessment Week and then a full set of Mock Examinations.

Prior to Assessment Weeks (AW) and Mock Examinations, timetables will be published. The timetables will be shared with students in school, sent as a text to parents, and also placed in the school newsletter.

OUTSTANDING RESULTS

Summer 2021 saw our Year 13 students achieve superb results which are a reflection of the hard work and commitment of our students and staff. This year our year 13 cohort had to complete their studies under extraordinary circumstances and they did this with great positivity and displayed an incredible level of resilience which has been rewarded with securing the highest grades and the most impressive of destinations.

We have been impressed with the manner in which our students approached their assessments and this ensured that as a Sixth Form we achieved the following outstanding results which places us in the top performing Sixth Forms in the country:

67% A*- B

84% A*- C

100% A*- E

As our Year 13 cohort received their results they also secured incredible university destinations and apprenticeships. 100% of our students secured their university pathways with 100% of our Medicine, Dentistry and Optometry applicants securing their first choice places. Approximately 25% of our university cohort went on to study at Russell Group universities and this is testimony to the aspirations and determination of our students and staff.

We are incredibly proud of all of our students for the way in which they have conducted themselves during their time at Sixth Form with their endless support of charitable causes and their continued leadership in serving others and this is an integral part of what it means to belong to our Catholic Sixth Form.

ENGLISH

A warm welcome back from the English department!

My name is Mrs. Elliott and I am delighted to introduce myself as the new Head of English. I would also like to welcome two other new members of the team – Ms. Johnston and Ms. Sendonari, who are also thrilled to be joining the department.

YEAR 7

This term, Year 7 will be studying the topic of 'Memoirs,' where they will read a diverse range of autobiographical writing by famous authors such as Roald Dahl, Michael Morpurgo, and Charles Dickens, in addition to writing their own memoirs. In their weekly reading lessons, Year 7 students will be reading the novel 'Refugee Boy' by local author Benjamin Zephaniah, which we know our students will love.

YEAR 8

Year 8's first topic this year is called 'Battlefields.' In this unit, students will study a wide range of both modern and classic texts written in response to writers' experiences of conflict, including famous poems such as 'In Flanders Fields' by John McCrae and 'Dulce et Decorum Est' by Wilfred Owen. In their weekly reading lessons, Year 8 students will enjoy the acclaimed novel 'Machine Gunners' by Robert Westall.

YEAR 9

Students in Year 9 will embark on an exciting journey this term as they study the topic 'Campaigns and Disasters'. They will explore a range of historical and current societal issues, including environmental issues and the representation of young people, and will be challenged to develop their own opinions in their writing and speaking. In their weekly reading lessons, we know that students will love reading the first book in the 'Noughts and Crosses' series by acclaimed writer Malorie Blackman.

YEAR 10

This term, our wonderful Year 10 students will begin their GCSE English Literature and Language courses. In English Literature, students will begin by studying the famous story of "star cross'd lovers," 'Romeo and Juliet' by William Shakespeare. In English Language, students will explore the writers' craft by reading the seminal text 'Lord of the Flies' by William Golding.

YEAR 12



YEAR 11 & 13






