Headteacher's Message

Welcome once again to our newsletter.

This has been a great week, so many good things have happened in our community that I am in distinct danger of running out of superlatives to describe the fantastic place that Stuart Bathurst is and how lucky I feel to be here. It has been extremely busy but the positive feeling around the school has invigorated everyone.

On Monday our Sports Week started with the Mile for Joel. As many of you know Joel, a former Head Boy was one of three members of his family who were victims of the terrorist atrocity on a beach in Tunisia in 2015. His family and our community still feel the loss of this wonderful young man and will continue to mark the anniversary of his tragic passing by raising money for the familie's charity. This year over £500 was collected which is an amazing testament to Joel and the mark he has left with our community. All through the week we have been treated to tournaments in quidditch and rugby and on Wednesday afternoon the whole school took part in a spectacular Sports Day. The launch of the new House system made this a beautiful colourful event where our pupils (and staff) competitive edge came to the fore. It was truly brilliant and the sun shone down from beginning to end. Veritas House were announced as winners of Sports Week so congratulations to them!

On Wednesday evening we welcomed our new Year 7 cohort and their families. This is always one of my favourite events as you can feel the excitement of both parents and pupils. The pupils have been with us on Thursday and Friday and it has been a pleasure to have them and we are looking forward to seeing them in September. Good luck for their SATs results which they will receive in the next few days too.

On Thursday we were visited by a National Leader in Safeguarding Practice who carried out a very thorough review. She looked at our recruitment processes, safeguarding routine training, curriculum offer, medical arrangements, site safety and she spoke to a group

of our young people. This was a follow-up visit from April and the initial feedback has been extremely reassuring, one comment was that she was "gobsmacked" at what has been achieved in a few months. Perhaps the most rewarding feedback came from our students who reported to her that not only did they feel safe but also that they all had at least one adult in school that they could talk to if they felt troubled. In addition, they said that now they felt they have a voice and that their voice was being listened to and acted upon. Safeguarding is and always will be our top priority, it is here that our professional duty in school begins and ends. Once pupils are safe, the rest falls into place.

This external endorsement was reiterated when a National Leader in Education came into school and looked at pupil's books in all subjects. She commented on the progress being made here also, particularly in English. To top all of this off, behaviour has been amazing this week, in fact in the three weeks since 100% Compliance has been introduced there have been almost 1400 less behaviour incidents reported by staff. That's 1400 less disruptions to learning, a decline of 71% so well done Stuart Bathurst Catholic School you are incredible!

So what about next week? Well this week the building work started on the exciting new project of the library, this work continues next week. This weekend we have workmen in school fitting some new magnetic locks to external doors within school to improve security around site. Work will also soon begin on fitting the gates at the front of school which I have to say I am looking forward to very much. Can I please ask parents who currently use the bus bay to arrange to collect their children from the retail park? This will have to be the case anyway when the gates are erected and I am becoming increasingly concerned by the parking and driving habits of some of our parents. This week a bus was trapped for about 20 minutes after school because of a parent blocking the way out.

This week was truly wonderful and I thank once again the staff, students and you our parents for your continued support.

John Henry Newman to be canonised on October 13



Blessed John Henry Newman will be canonised on Sunday, October 13, the Vatican has announced. Newman is the first English person who has lived since the 17th century to be recognised as a saint by the Catholic Church.

Newman (1801-1890) was ordained as a Church of England priest and soon became the leader of the Oxford Movement but converted to Catholicism in 1845. He founded the Oratory in England and was later made a cardinal. When he died at the age of 89, more than 15,000 people lined the streets of Birmingham for his funeral. The cause for his sainthood was opened in 1958 and he was declared Venerable by Pope Saint John Paul II in 1991 after his life of "heroic virtue" was recognised.

Pope Benedict XVI declared him Blessed in Cofton Park near Birmingham in September 2010. The canonisation was made possible by a second miracle attributed to the intercession of Blessed John Henry Newman, consisting in the medically inexplicable healing of a pregnant woman with life-threatening complications due to her pregnancy.

During the ceremony for his beatification in 2010, Pope Benedict said that Newman "tells us that our divine Master has assigned a specific task to each one of us, a 'definite service', committed uniquely to every single person."

In our everyday lives we can reflect on the service of John Henry Newman and use his works as an inspiration to live by:

"God has created me to do Him some definite service. He has committed some work to me which He has not committed to another. I have my mission. I may never know it in this life, but I shall be told it in the next. I am a link in a chain, a bond of connection between persons. He has not created me for naught. I shall do good; I shall do His work. I shall be an angel of peace, a preacher of truth in my own place, while not intending it if I do but keep His commandments. Therefore, I will trust Him, whatever I am, I can never be thrown away."

SUNDAY WORSHIP AND REFLECTION

The first reading (Isaiah 66:10-14) is about the joy of going home to mother! Ever remember coming home to the smell of the bread, the ornaments in the home and the hug of your mother? The God of joy is bringing his people home.

WELCOMED WITH JOY

This welcoming with joy and solidarity keeps us human and humble. We need each other to find joy in God, we do not go to God on our own. We have one God who is like father and mother to us, and we are brothers and sisters.

God is the mother welcoming and merciful, no matter where we have been or what we have done. God the mother invites us to follow the Lord Jesus. The things of Jesus are to be first in life – mercy, forgiveness, the common good of all, faith and prayer.

We recognise people by their step or their knock on the door. It is a knowledge of the heart. This is like the intimacy of our relationship with God. It is an intimate knowing.

This is the reason of the Church – to be the community in love and for love. Pope Francis calls the church 'a love story'. The love of the mother God still around today. Calls us not to Jerusalem but to the living God in our parish, school, family, and neighbourhood. In our loves of friendship, of marriage and for the poor. Calling us to find this reign of God in love and spread it in works of justice, compassion and mercy.

A Mile For Joel!

This last week at school we have very much been finding the love of God in all things and our week began with a whole school charity event to support Smile For Joel. All students participated in 'walk a mile for Joel' raising £500 which will be donated to the Victim Support. The Richards family are well loved and remembered members of our school community and the whole school turned out to show their love and support for the outstanding work of this incredible charity.

As I have a three year old daughter I have to love all the Disney and Pixar films even though I have watched them 100 times – Toy story, Monster Inc and Lion King.

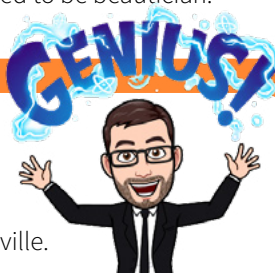

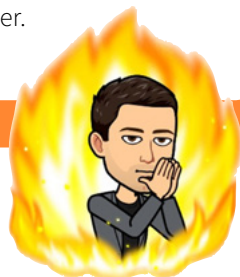

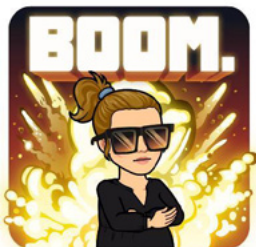

Features of a gurdwara

- **Nishan Sahib:** the Nishan Sahib is a triangular orange flag with the Sikh symbol of a Khanda in the middle of it represents the values of the Sikh faith.
- **Langar:** Langar or free kitchen is the part of a Gurudwara where meals are served to the worshippers who have come to pray. Although some Gurudwaras have tables and chairs as a tradition, worshippers are expected to sit on the floor.
- **Sangat:** The Sangat is a holy congregation of people. They sit and listen to the prayers that are being read out in the Gurudwara.
- **Golak:** A Golak is known as the collection box, that is normally found in front of the Guru Granth Sahib, where worshippers put their offerings of coins or paper notes, before bowing or kneeling down to the Guru Granth Sahib.

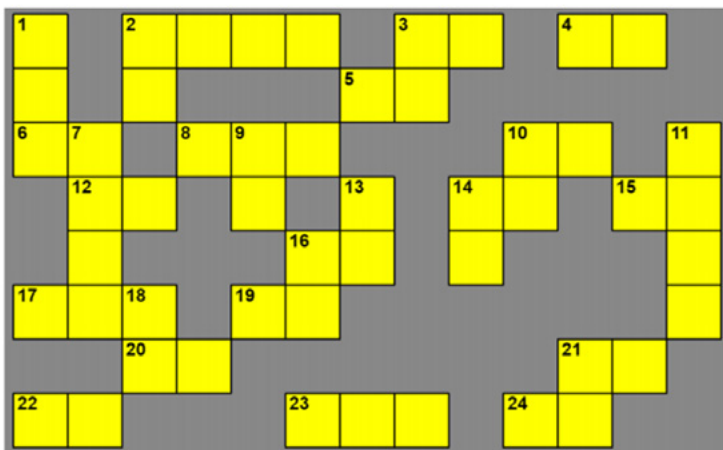
