# **RETURNING TO SCHOOL IN JANUARY**

### Return to school lateral flow testing: **Tues 04 Jan 2022**

### Entrance for testing: Door by Internal Inclusion

The government has asked all schools to offer one on-site test before students return to school in January and has authorised schools to plan this as they see fit in the first week.

At Stuart Bathurst, our staff are involved in an INSET day on Tuesday 04 January and there will be no lessons taking place. We have decided to use this day to offer our on-site test in accordance with this schedule.

Students simply need to come to school in their allocated time slot, complete the lateral flow test and then can return home.

They do not need to wait for the result; we will notify you if it is positive and if you need to book a PCR test.

### **Positive Test Result**

If your lft test is positive, you will need a negative PCR test result before you can return to school.

### **Negative Test Result**

If it is negative, there will be no notification.

If you have previously given consent for testing, you do not need to do this again. If you have not previously given consent for testing, your child will have been issued with a letter for return this week.

Please note that if you have children in different year groups, they can attend the same testing slot rather than you make multiple trips to school.

### Return to lessons: Wed 05 Jan 2022

All lessons will resume on Wednesday 5th January 2022 where school will start at 8.50am.

# **MISSION WEEK REVIEW**

Last week, Stuart Bathurst invited the mission team into our school, a group of young individuals from the Kenelm Youth Trust who aimed to help young people find their voice as part of the Mission Week's theme, Roar. Our school's chaplaincy team worked closely alongside the group to aid them in the sessions they hosted throughout the week with different year groups. I met with the team on Monday as part of the chaplaincy team, where we introduced ourselves and were briefed on what would be happening throughout the week.

I participated in many sessions within my year group but the week gave me the opportunity to help with many other year group's workshops, as part of my role in chaplaincy. There were several sessions that took place throughout the week, with some focusing on mental health, prayer, reconciliation and finding our own voice. I really enjoyed the session that was hosted by members of the mission team on Wednesday, where I met with

groups of students from many years groups and discussed issues that they felt were prevalent within our society today. I found it very interesting hearing about how our pupils feel about societal problems such as racism and sexism that people face every day. The mission team asked the groups to discuss how we can make a change to combat these issues in and outside of our school environment, where I heard many great ideas. To know that the school were going to take these ideas on board to further improve our school community, it felt rewarding to know that we can make a change.

There were numerous sessions held over the week that centred around worship. At lunchtimes all students were given the opportunity to light a candle and say a prayer in our chapel where they could spend some quiet time to themselves and on Thursday, a time of reconciliation was held all day, where pupils could go to confession with a priest or simply talk to them. I took part in confession where I found it very uplifting and enlightening to talk and be open with a member of the church. On Friday, the week was ended with a mass where the school came together in their year groups to celebrate the week we had experienced through a time of prayer.

I feel that the mission week has greatly strengthened my faith and relationship with God. It gave me the chance to meet with new people and hear of their experiences with faith. I spoke with students across the school who also felt that it had made a positive impact on them. It was sad to see the mission team leave Stuart Bathurst but knowing that they had made a positive impact will inspire future change within our school community.



# **HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS**

Our School curriculum is sequenced to help students know and remember more. All departments have designed their curriculum to build upon knowledge over time using interleaving strategies and retrieval practice. Teachers share with the pupils the learning journey making it explicit how subject content and skills cross over between departments and can be applied in their current learning.

Homework is an extension of this learning process. Through the varied homework tasks set, pupils are:

- Encouraged and supported to know and remember more through self-quizzing
- Pupils will receive feedback that will focus on moving the learning forward targeting specific learning gaps identified by the class teacher
- Preparing pupils for End of Topic assessments (EOT) and Assessment Week (AW)
- Help build pupil selfconfidence, pupil motivation and independence by holding the pupils to account for the completion of homework as per the deadlines set by their class teachers

### Subject Class Teachers

Class teachers will set all homework through ClassCharts.

Class teachers will mark all homework as per departmental marking and feedback polices. Self-quizzing books will be checked and initialled by the class teacher upon completion.

Class teachers are to reward the completion of and sanction the incompletion of homework through the use of ClassCharts.

### **Homework Expectations**

Homework guidelines for each key stage are:

**KS3:** 30 minutes per subject of Self quizzing and one supplementary task per subject

**KS4:** 30 minutes per subject of Self quizzing and one supplementary task per subject

### KS5: 3 hours per subject

It is the pupil's responsibility to ensure that they have their ClassChart log in. Pupils can get their ClassChart log in from their form tutor.

### **Homework Detention Process**

If a student fails to hand in a piece of homework, the student is given an additional 24 hours to complete it. This will be recorded on ClassCharts using the "Homework Warning".

A student can only receive the 24hour extension once per half term for each subject. If a student fails to hand in the homework following the 24-hour extension, they are placed in afterschool detention.

If a student fails to hand in the homework and the 24-hour extension has already been used, they are placed in afterschool detention. Parents will be informed if their son/daughter is to be placed in detention.



# **UNIFORM UPDATE**

Firstly, I would like to thank you for your ongoing support with your children and their education at Stuart Bathurst. This term has been seen the reintroduction of an afterschool detention, a renewed focus on homework, punctuality and standards in uniform.

As we end the Autumn term and look to the Spring, I would like to remind all parents of the standards stated in letter Miss Raindi sent out earlier in the term.

#### FOOTWEAR

Shoes (ending BELOW the ankle) MUST be black leather and low-heeled. All footwear must fit securely and give proper support to the feet to meet our Health and Safety requirements. BOOTS, SANDALS, SLINGBACKS AND PLATFORMS ARE NOT ALLOWED. Please remember that from January 2022, boots are not allowed.

NO leather trainers or leisure shoes are permitted including brands such as Vans, Converse or other sports brands.

### **TROUSERS & TOPS**

NO skinny fit school trouser or leggings. School trousers must be regular fit.

NO hoodies / tracksuit or sports tops with the exception of the Stuart Bathurst PE Kit.

### **JEWELLERY & MAKE-UP**

NO jewellery (other than those worn for religious purposes, for example students may wear a Sikh Kara or a small cross and chain under their blouse/shirt but this must be removed for PE).

ONE single stud in the lower lobe in terms of earrings is allowed.

NO badges (other than those approved by the school) may be worn.

NO nail varnish or false nails.

NO noticeable, obvious or excessive make-up (school's discretion and students will be expected to remove).

#### HAIRCUTS & ACCESSORIES

No extreme haircuts. The school will use its discretion in determining this but will not accept eyebrow slits, shavings, lines, unnatural colourings, extreme partings or extreme variations in length. Any hair accessories must be conservative, anything outlandish will be challenged.

### UNIFORM ADDITIONS

A plain white round necked T-shirt may be worn underneath the shirt for warmth in cold weather.

Maroon V-neck jumper with school badge embroidered.

Outdoor coat/jacket must be plain black, grey or navy (not leather, denim or corduroy). NOT to be worn inside classrooms unless directed by the Head of School.

### PE KIT

In the Spring term there will also be a renewed focus on the Stuart Bathurst PE Kit and there will be a further letter from Mrs Wright addressing this.

I would like to echo Miss Raindi and I ask for your continued support as parents and carers to ensure that students are in the correct uniform and footwear when we begin the Spring Term.

# ENGLISH

Hello from the English department! We have had an absolutely wonderful term in English this term.

Since September, we have seen our students rise to the challenge of a new academic year. They have given their all and well and truly immersed themselves in their English study.

Teachers of Year 7 have loved seeing our new pupils working hard on the foundations of English by embedding reciprocal reading skills and personal writing styles in their study of texts centred around the theme of 'Memoirs.'

Year 8 have thoroughly impressed their teacher with their mature and skilful approach to reading and writing about 'Conflict,' while Year 9 have been busy discussing and debating challenging topics through the lens of 'Campaigns and Disasters.'

All of our KS3 students have also loved getting stuck in to their class readers for their weekly reading lessons. Year 7 have enjoyed reading Benjamin Zephaniah's 'Refugee Boy,' Year 8 have travelled back in time to WW2 when reading Robert Westall's 'The Machine Gunners,' and Year 9 have loved discussing the themes and issues raised in the first of the 'Noughts and Crosses' series by Malorie Blackman.

Similarly, our KS4 students have engaged brilliantly in their study of both GCSE English Literature and Language. Our Y11s are busy preparing for their upcoming mock examinations after Christmas, with teachers commenting on the extremely mature attitude that they have taken to their lessons. In Years 12 and 13, the KS5 team have loved delving deep in their study of both English Literature and Media Studies.

Many of our KS3 students have engaged in Accelerated Reader and are pushing up the school's target of 'Reading to Mars' on a daily basis! Next term, teachers are very much looking forward to beginning new topics with students. Year 7 students will be studying the topic of 'Myths and Legends,' where they will be reading classical tales from around the world, and writing their own myths too!

Year 8 will be developing their understanding of poetry further as they explore 'People in and out of Places' – a collection of poetry connected to ideas around identity and place.

Year 9 will be exploring the wonderful work of the bard – William Shakespeare – by studying a range of famous soliloquies from his famous histories, comedies and tragedies.

Year 10 will continue their study of English Language Paper 1, and in English Literature will be developing their analysis skills through the study of unseen poetry.

Our Y11 and A-level classes will continue to build their knowledge and skills as they progress through the texts and topics that they have been working on this term.

Overall, we are absolutely thrilled with the way that students have engaged in their English lessons. We hope that all of our students and their loved ones have a wonderful Christmas and a happy new year.

"In the lonely barton by yonder coomb Our childhood used to know," I should go with him in the gloom, Hoping it might be so.






Earlier in the term, 8W1 were tasked with the homework of creating a fact file/ poem or poster to celebrate what they have been learning this year.

### **PSYCHOLOGY**

Year 10: What a fantastic first term Year 10 have had studying Psychology. Students have been learning about Memory and Research Methods and have really engaged with their new subject. A special well done to Ellie Yarnall and Zain Chowdary for their amazing effort so early in the course.

Year 11: Topics such as Social Influence and Language Thought and communication have been studied by Year 11 since September, this makes 50% of Paper 2 complete. Also, this half term revision sessions have been ongoing and a special shout out to the following students for attending all revision sessions so far: Ellie Hunter, Fatima Patel, Abdullah Raza, Zahra Riaz and Danyaal Yasar. Also, over the course of their studies students have been provided with revision resources, which they should already be using to revise and prepare for their mocks in January.

Year 12: Well done to Year 12 Psychology students, for making the transition to their A-levels. Students have been studying topics such as Social Influence, Approaches, Memory and Psychopathology and have shown a good interest in future careers around the subject area. A reminder that independent study should be ongoing outside of the classroom and also some students are attending revision catch up sessions too which have been prearranged with the Head of Department.

## MATHEMATICS

Students in maths have been working really hard this autumn term and we are really pleased with the progress they have made.

### **GCSE** Assessments

All students have now completed two GCSE exam papers since they have returned to school in September. We are really pleased to see students have made clear progress from their exams at the end of the last academic year.

All students have been given their personalised Question Level Analysis (QLA) and should use these to improve on their identified areas of weakness, using online resources as well as revision guides purchased from school. ### Year 11 Maths GCSE Countdown

When your son or daughter comes back to school after the Christmas break, we only have another 78 maths lessons up until the first exam. This may seem like a lot, but we have had 84 lessons this academic year already. It is therefore crucial that they are making the best use of these lessons.

When students return in January, will be completing an intensive three-week revision course in preparation for their examinations in hall. These exams may will be used to help determine the final GCSE grade should exams not take place, so is imperative that students prepare for these thoroughly. A topic list will be provided in January.

In order to help with revision, we will be putting on compulsory revision sessions afterschool. It is critical that students are attending all of these.

### Homework & Sparx Maths

### **HUMANITIES**


We have had a wonderful start to the year in History and Geography, all staff in the department have been impressed by the efforts of our students across all year groups.




