

Catholic News – A Beatification! News from Vatican City...

This week saw Pope Francis approve a miracle attributed to Archbishop Fulton Sheen Friday, making possible the American television catechist's beatification.

The miracle involves the unexplained recovery of James Fulton Engstrom, a boy born apparently stillborn in September 2010 to Bonnie and Travis Engstrom of the Peoria-area town of Goodfield. He showed no signs of life as medical professionals tried to revive him. The child's mother and father prayed to Archbishop Sheen to heal their son.

A seven-member panel of medical experts advising the Vatican Congregation for the Causes of Saints gave unanimous approval of the miracle attributed to the famous television personality and evangelist in March 2014.

Archbishop Sheen was a beloved television catechist during the 1950s and 60s in the United States. His Emmy-award winning television show "Life is Worth Living" reached an audience of millions. Such events remind us that God is never far from us and with faith anything is possible.

SUNDAY WORSHIP AND REFLECTION

Sunday Focus – Time to be a Good Samaritan

We know the parable of the Good Samaritan is a lesson to teach us that we must love our neighbour, and that there's no one in the category of non-neighbour, but beyond that, Pope Francis asks us, have we also learned the parable's lesson that God treats us with the compassion of the Samaritan?

"In the gestures and the actions of the Good Samaritan we recognize God's merciful action in the whole history of salvation. It is the same compassion with which the Lord comes to meet each one of us: He does not ignore us, He knows our sorrows; He knows how much we need help and consolation. He comes close to us and never abandons us. Each one of us should ask himself the question and answer in his heart: 'Do I believe this? Do I believe that the Lord has compassion for me, just as I am, a sinner, with so many problems and so many things?' Think of this and the answer is: 'Yes!' But each one must look into his heart to see if he has faith in this compassion of God, of the good God who comes close, who heals us, who caresses us. And if we refuse Him, He waits: He is patient and is always at our side."

The Samaritan's concrete, personal actions teach us "that compassion, love, is not a vague feeling, but it means to take care of the other even to paying in person," Francis said. "It means to commit oneself, taking all the necessary steps to 'come close' to the other, to the point of identifying oneself with him: 'you shall love your neighbour as yourself.' Behold the Lord's Commandment."



Construction work in the new library space has begun, plans for library layout are being finalised and a 1,000 glossy, new and engaging books are waiting to fill the shelves. The interior of the library has been discussed with students and I am currently hooked on searching and scrolling through

images of displays of books in libraries throughout schools, universities; libraries of film fiction and the libraries of towns and cities around the UK to see what exciting, comfortable and engaging spaces we can create in our own little book haven.

From September, all Year 7 and Year 8 students will be completing an Accelerated Reader assessment to launch their profile on the programme so that their reading can accrue valuable AR and House points but, most importantly, so that their reading can empower their intelligence and their curiosity for language and ideas.
