Advent is here!

Advent is the period of four Sundays and weeks before Christmas. The word means 'coming' and this is the time when we remember that Jesus came into the world and we think about how we can remember the real meaning of Christmas.

We reflect on three things during Advent, when Jesus came long ago, how he is here with us in the present and we look forward to when He will come in the future. During Advent we try to be a little more like Jesus in what we do and this is why we always think of others and try to share what we have with those who may not have the same comforts we enjoy.

This year Advent began on Sunday, November 27th, and ends on Saturday, December 24.

Symbols of Advent

The Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolising everlasting life in the midst of winter and death. The circle reminds us of God's unending love and the eternal life He makes possible. Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath.

Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red colour points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice and death. Pinecones can symbolise the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection. Families begin lighting a candle on the fourth Sunday before Christmas, and they light another candle each subsequent Sunday. The most common Advent candle tradition, however, involves four candles. A new candle is lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. Each candle represents something different, although traditions vary. The four candles traditionally represent hope, faith, joy, and peace. Often, the first, second, and fourth candles are purple; the third candle is rose-coloured. Sometimes all the candles are red; in other traditions, all four candles are blue or white. Occasionally, a fifth white candle is placed in the middle and is lit on Christmas Day to celebrate Jesus' birth.

Whichever tradition you might like to adopt, the symbolism of light growing in the darkness as we lead up to remembering Jesus' birth is something that all Christians celebrate.

This Advent, Lord, come to the manger of my heart. Fill me with Your presence from the very start. As I prepare for the holidays and gifts to be given, Remind me of the gift You gave when You sent Your Son from Heaven.


Remembering others in prayer

LITERACY

At Stuart Bathurst we are committed to developing Literacy skills in all of our students, in the belief that this will support their learning and raise standards in all areas of the curriculum, enabling them to cope confidently with the demands of further education, employment and adult life.

Teachers will be working on strategies to help students become more confident and fluent readers alongside looking at ways of developing oracy in each subject area. I am looking forward to showcasing the fantastic work of our students over the course of the year.

How to help develop reading and vocabulary

Information for parents and carers

Did you know?

Research shows that reading for pleasure has the most impact on the frequency at which young people read, their educational achievement and their personal development.

Renaissance Learning's report for 2018 showed that in primary school, children are generally reading books that are of a level exceeding their age and ability. Unfortunately, this changes at secondary school; children in Year 7 generally read books which are levelled at a year below their age and this gap either plateaus or continues to widen throughout the remainder of their time at secondary school.

Research has shown that as they grow older, children find reading less enjoyable and they also read less frequently. We also know from research that, in general, boys enjoy reading less than girls.



What can you do?

3 things to do if your child is at Key Stage 3:

Encourage your child to find texts they enjoy; choice and interest in reading is key. Spend some time at the library or a local book store and ask someone who works there to give suggestions based on your child's interests, films or books they've enjoyed or any new and popular books other children have enjoyed. Some research has shown that children who have books of their own enjoy reading more, but it is often worth ensuring that they're confident they'll enjoy the authors/texts they are choosing before investing!

Encourage your child to read for 15-30 minutes every day. This doesn't have to be novels - it could be short stories or even non-fiction. If your child is willing, sit with them and read together so that you can discuss and tease out some of the issues that crop up.

If your child has shown an interest in a recent issue in the news, or a particular topic at school, look into nonfiction articles or books related to it and help them see how they can follow their own interests and develop their knowledge of different areas they find engaging.

3 things to do if your child is at Key Stage 4:

By this age, young people can sometimes be harder to inspire in areas like reading. It can sometimes be worth

having a discussion about what your child dislikes, or finds difficult, about reading; be open-minded about their views and try to discuss ways around these together. It's fine to have dislikes, but what might they enjoy reading? Where could they make a start?

Encourage your child to find texts they enjoy; choice and interest in reading is key. This doesn't have to be fiction, it could be non-fiction extracts or whole texts too. You may find text ideas together, from your child's own selection or seek advice from their teachers at school. Due to the nature of GCSE English Language, you may find that your child's school library or English department have banks of fiction and non-fiction extracts for them to explore. This can help them, and you, to get a feel for what may interest them before widening your search to whole texts.

Consider, with your child, what subjects or topics they are particularly enjoying and seek out fiction and/ or non-fiction linked to those. For example, some young people who like science enjoy biographies of well-known scientists from across the ages, those interested in history have a whole wealth of fiction and non-fiction available to them in their chosen areas of interest and those who enjoy maths may find books about topics like Alan Turing's Enigma machine of interest.

HOME LEARNING

OUR PHILOSOPHY

The Educational Endowment Fund Toolkit shows that the impact of home learning is consistently positive, leading to an average of five months additional progress across an academic career. We believe that home learning should be considered an integral part of learning and progress. We believe that home learning should not be measured by its duration of time to complete but by the quality of provision provided. It should be relevant and set for a purpose.

By committing the skills and knowledge required to long term memory it frees up working memory so that processing information is easier when solving problems. Home learning at SBCHS is therefore designed to practise and learn the content and skills required and gain deep knowledge within every subject. This style of homework also promotes and builds independent study skills needed for study beyond school. Subject teachers will set home learning tasks that are designed to embed skills and knowledge.

HOMEWORK DETENTION PROCESS

If a student fails to hand in a piece of homework, the student is given an additional 24 hours to complete the homework. This will be recorded on ClassCharts using the "Homework Warning".

A student can only receive the 24-hour extension once per half term for each subject. If a student fails to hand in the homework following the 24-hour extension, they are placed in afterschool detention.

If a student fails to hand in the homework and the 24-hour extension has already been used, they are placed in afterschool detention. Parents will be informed if their son/daughter is to be placed in detention.

WHAT HOME LEARNING WILL LOOK LIKE

Research suggests that pupils learn more when they are allowed to practise fewer concepts. Therefore home learning tasks should be set in small chunks in terms of content or focused on particular skills in order to be properly understood by pupils.

Home learning at Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School will consist of elements of Retrieval, Application and Preparation (RAP)

YEAR 9

For English, mathematics and RE, two pieces of home learning for each subject lasting them a maximum of 20 minutes.

YEAR 10 & 11

Students will receive one piece of home learning per subject. The time allocated will depend on the nature of key stage 4 course.

YEAR 12 & 13

Students are expected to complete up to 5 hours of independent work per week, guided by teachers. Students will also be directed to wider reading in their subjects.

Students are expected to write details of their home learning in their planners. Subject teachers will also write details of the work to be completed on

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION Department Update

YEAR 7

This half-term Y7 have been learning and studying about the importance of the Old Testament. Students have looked at the key events of the Old Testament such as the Creation account of Genesis and the importance of the Covenants with Noah. Through this unit, students have also analysed various ways that Christians interpret the Bible, and how this may influence different religious believers in their lives. Next half-term, students will be moving on to looking at the New Testament and the life of Jesus. Throughout this unit, students will delve into the life, actions and significance of Jesus' moral teachings in the world today.

YEAR 8

Year 8 have been learning about the Covenants God made with Noah, Abraham and Moses. We have been reading extracts from the bible, interpreting artwork and considering why God chose these people to make his promises with.

Next half term we will be looking at vocations. We will be learning about the different roles God can call us to do and studying about the calling some Saints received and the difference they made to the world.

YEAR 9

This half term, Year 9 students have been learning about Social Responsibility. This unit is based on the principles on which Catholic Social Teaching is based, the teaching of the Church on our duties and responsibilities towards others. We began with looking at some of the teachings of Jesus, including the Golden Rule and what it means to love one's neighbour. We then looked at the concept of Imago Dei, the idea that all humans are made in the image of God and as such deserve to be treated with love and dignity. Finally we have applied these teachings and the principles of Catholic Social Teaching to the work of charities such as CAFOD and case studies relating to poverty, racism and homelessness.

Next half-term, year 9 will be studying the Authority of the Church. This unit focuses on the role of the Pope and bishops in communicating Catholic teachings and morals. The unit will also examine the development of different Christian denominations and how this has led to differences of attitude towards religious and moral authority within Christianity, including attitudes towards the authority of the Bible.

YEAR 10

After finishing the Judaism practises unit, Year 10s were able to complete a full paper just before Christmas in order to get a feel for what the real GCSEs will be like. I was so impressed with the effort and dedication of Year 10 students in the lead up to the assessment as they prepared themselves using revision guides, knowledge organisers and past exam questions. It is this enthusiasm that will help them to achieve the best that they can in their assessments. Just before Christmas, we have started Origins and Meanings which is a new unit all about different beliefs on the origin of humanity and the world. 10E1 had a fantastic discussion and debate in their lesson today. Well done Year 10- keep up the amazing work.

YEAR 11

I don't know where time seems to go with our Year 11s! They are working at such a great pace and I could not be prouder of the year group and their effort in RE after their mocks. We have moved on from Life and Death and we are starting our Sin and Forgiveness unit. As an early Christmas present, all Year 11 students received an RE revision pack that will help them revise. All students will also have a topic list and guided revision that will ensure that they are fully prepared for their exams.






KS3 Boys Dodgeball tournament

PERFORMING ARTS Department Update

It has been a very busy first term in Music and Drama. We have enjoyed being part of the busy run up to Christmas! We were delighted to get instrument lessons going, and the department is often full of the sound of the many students who are taking advantage of the wonderful peripatetic tuition.

In Drama, we have been studying scripted performances with Year 9, exploring 'Noughts and Crosses' by Dominic Webb. Year 8 were exploring 'DNA', and with Year 7 - 'Harry Potter and the Cursed Child'. All pupils have been exploring the skills needed to perform these plays, with each pupil taking on a role and being assessed in their performance. It is an honour to teach such talented students and I have found many of their performances inspiring and very moving.

In the term ahead we will be continuing to look at the theatre practitioner, Brecht and the students will be studying three of his text in the coming half term. This work enables students to explore how Drama can be used to change society. In Music, Year 7 have been discovering the fundamental building blocks of sound - the elements of Music. They have also been getting to grips with the dexterity needed to master the keyboard!

Year 8 have begun to explore sequencing and the role of technology in recording musical ideas. Some of their electronic composition work has been outstanding.

Year 9 have taken their sequencing work to the next level with a remixing project. They have created their own tracks using samples and stems from contemporary tracks by Dua Lipa, Stormzy and even the soundtrack to Stranger Things.

We understand there can be health problems, but don't believe that the 'odd day off can't harm'. Research carried out on the effects of broken weeks and achievement is astounding.

- Try to judge how 'severe' the student's illness is. Do they really need to stay at home?
- How many students are better by lunchtime? Send them back to school!

- Non-urgent GP, Dental appointments and checkups should be made outside school time (after 15.20).
- If an appointment must be made in school time absence will only be authorised for a reasonable margin of time. Not half a day to go to local GP/ Dentist. We understand Orthodontic treatments and Hospital appointments may take longer.
