Welcome to our Newsletter.

It is with immense pleasure that I write the final newsletter of this half term having been offered the permanent position of Headteacher of Stuart Bathurst Catholic School. The letter from the Chair of Governors (on the left) explains the selection process which I can confirm was very thorough! I have of course accepted the role and feel very privileged to be leading such a wonderful community in the next phase of its journey.

I chose the quote above as I felt that actually it sums up my role a little but in honesty I think I have created waves in the eight months since my arrival and those waves have gone on to move the school forward. I am however not on my own in doing so, the students and staff of the school and you as parents have been key in ensuring that the school has regained its positive standing both locally and also across the diocese. Recently published figures confirm that the school reached national average with our GCSE results, a huge improvement from the previous year.

We have great hopes for this year's examinees too. Year 11 held a revision evening last night and I thank those parents who attended. I hope that parents can see that we as teachers are putting everything we can into ensuring your child succeeds. They now need to do their bit and use the half term break to revise for their first set of mocks.

I think we can also be proud of the opportunities we offer our young people. Last Sunday, Mr Virk led a Sixth Form visit to Krakow in Poland. There is a lovely article, written by one of the young people who went, later in the Newsletter. The itinerary of their visit included visiting Auschwitz where they all prayed together, a talk with a holocaust survivor and also a tour of Oskar Schindler's factory.

I studied "Schindler's Ark" by Thomas Keneally as one of my A' level English texts and I must say it still resounds with me to this day. It tells the story of a man determined to break the vile Nazi regime of the Second World War. My favourite quote from the book "Whoever saves one life saves the world entire", is a good mantra for living. Oskar Schindler saved the lives of 1200 Jewish people by employing them in his enamelware factory. Whilst we are not saving lives here on a daily basis, I am confident that we are changing them for the better.

Can I take this opportunity to remind parents of the school uniform expectations? Please don't allow your child to have facial piercings or dye their hair with an unnatural colour. School shoes are a standard item of footwear and all children need to be wearing them on arrival and at all times of the day. Girls should not be wearing tube/lycra skirts and when wearing skirts, they should be wearing tights.

SCHOOL FUND REQUEST

Dear Parent / Carer,

As you know, we are working hard to improve the learning environment across Stuart Bathurst Catholic School. In order to fund some of the added extras in our school we may sometimes have to reach outside the school for additional funding and each year we ask for some contribution towards this. I would like to thank those of you who have been able to support and contribute in the past, your donations have been incredibly helpful and have had a significant impact on the running of the school.

In the last few months, we have been lucky enough to secure external funding to turn the old staff room into an amazing library space. We want to instil a lifelong love of reading and learning and so, giving the young people in our care a fantastic place to read is a good start. The school also secured funding from Teach First to purchase the 'Accelerated Reader' scheme, this is a powerful tool for monitoring and managing independent reading practice whilst promoting reading for pleasure. It has been proven to boost literacy levels and encourage students to read a wide range of literature. Whilst we have the books to implement this scheme we do not have the funds to purchase all the books that the scheme requires and this will limit the choice that the students have on this scheme.

This is where you come in. We are asking parents and carers to contribute just £10 per child (or £12 per family) to school fund, which will go directly into funding books for the 'Accelerated Reader' scheme and if we are fortunate to have any additional money raised we will buy other books for our students to enjoy. Payments can be made by cash or cheque. Please place either in an envelope marked School Fund with your child's name and the amount you are donating. We will provide you with a receipt. Note that cheques should be made payable to 'Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School.' Of course, should you feel able to donate more, then you would not be limited to this amount, and equally we will be grateful for whatever help you are able to give us.

We really appreciate and rely on your generosity. Our priority is the education of your children and to support this, we are hoping that, where possible, our fantastic parent body may be able to make a further, significant contribution to maintaining our high standards.

YEAR 11

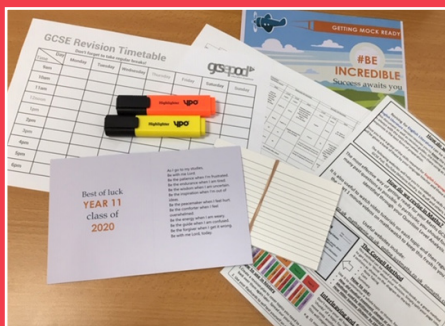

KRAKÓW TRIP 2019

"The Trip to Kraków and the surrounding area was a phenomenal and intense experience that I consider to be life changing. Kraków is a location in Poland closest to the Auschwitz concentration camp, in which 80% of people who entered the camp were immediately sent to death, and those that survived were subject to experimentation, inhumane living conditions, desolate starvation and unimaginable suffering. Witnessing the place where so many innocent people needlessly died at the hands of the Nazi's cruel regime is truly heart-breaking, and something I will carry with me until the day I die. It's an experience that fills you with gratitude for everything you have and a sense of freedom that the poor people who were led to their deaths sadly never got to experience.

As well as visiting the two camps Auschwitz and Auschwitz Berkanel, we also met a survivor who was a child at the camp. The story she told was a chilling tale of starvation, cruelty and loss. What is particularly saddening is the story of how her mother stole food to give to her, and the hunger she experienced caused her to forget

her mother's face, only remembering "her hands, and the food they contained". Her mother died in the evacuation march when the Soviet Union were taking back Poland, and she was left behind to starve to death. The Soviets liberating the camp was the only thing that prevented her from dying. The trauma didn't end there. The survivor was emotionally crippled by the horrible events that had occurred, causing difficulties in interacting with other people for many years throughout her life. She now tells her story to others in a solemn reminder that we can never let things like this happen again.

Despite the immense amounts of cruelty that occurred during wartime, there was hope for those in the Kraków ghetto. This hope was a man named Oskar Schindler, who risked horrible execution at the hands of the Nazis by helping Jews escape their fascist riddled homeland. These little acts of bravery saved many lives of Jews who would have suffered incredibly cruel conditions if not for Schindler, seeing his office and what was contained in the museum built out of the building will forever give me hope for humanity. One man was able to prove that humanity, even in its darkest moments, will strive to protect and help the weakest and most ridiculed of those amongst us.

Kraków today is incredibly beautiful. A guided tour of the City showed us amazing feats of architecture and the acute artistic disposition of all the historic residents who reside within the city. Despite the cruelty of the war, the City remains attractive for its rich history, superb commercial wealth and wonderful culture.

The trip was an amazing experience that I was proud to have and would greatly recommend to anyone planning on going in the future. It is somewhere that everybody should visit at least once in their lives, and every second spent there is worth it."

THE LIBRARY IS ALMOST READY FOR ITS GRAND OPENING!

We are excited to have a fully functional library back at Stuart Bathurst. Mrs Morris' vision for the Learning Resource Centre has become a fantastic actuality and will be of tremendous benefit to our pupils. I am very excited to be so involved in the project and am keen to tell you about some of what the library is going to offer pupils after half term.

Currently, we have over 1,000 books in the library. We will need more. Reading is not a finite experience and so we want to keep our library stock as up to date and as plentiful as possible; you have been asked for help with this. Of those 1,000 books, we have an excellent range of teen fiction that is ready for Years 7 and 8 to embark on Accelerated Reader journey after the October break.

Students in Years 7 and 8 have been STAR tested this week. This test will provide a reading age and a ZPD. This ZPD number will guide your child toward a specific range of books that suit their current reading and decoding ability. They will be encouraged to check a book out of the library and complete a quiz when finished. The quiz score will tell me, the LRC manager, their English teacher and their form teacher how well they have understood the book.

The more they read, the more proficiently they will be able to decode and comprehend. Success within Accelerated Reader has been proven to have a positive impact on reading habits and attainment in exams. Although this attainment is important, I am keen to encourage a culture of reading that has 'reading for pleasure' at its core.

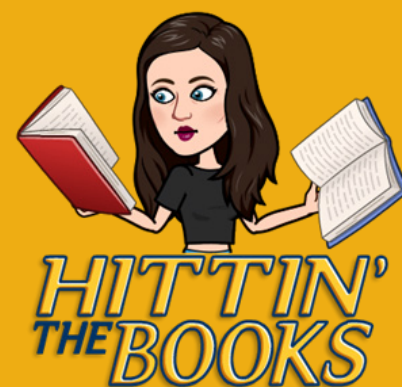
The new library is a clean, smart and vibrant place where pupils can make contact with a wide range of books, collaborate in their book browsing and find something that will engage as well as challenge their interests. I want pupils to work towards becoming 'word millionaires'; to use the books they check out to expand their vocabulary range and thus their academic and life potential. The LRC manager will run competitions to encourage students to reach their 100% AR quiz result. Extra-curricular activities will be run. Staff all over the school will be keen to encourage pupils to read in their lessons and during form time.

In our striving to be word-rich and word-curious, we will often position 'the book' at the core of learning. This week, I have told all staff that they are needed in the quest to drive reading forward. And I need you too.

YOU CAN HELP YOUR CHILD WITH THEIR READING BY:

- Asking questions about the book that has been borrowed from the library; what is it about? Which characters do they like? Where is it set? What could happen next?
- Linking viewing habits to books; look for adaptations and encourage the reading of the book as well as a shared viewing of the film or series so that everyone can talk about the plot.
- Read the book your child is reading!
- Encouraging the quizzing. Ask your child about their quiz scores.

I hope all families enjoy the half term and some of the time can be spent immersed in a book to transport us from our own climate on the rainier days.

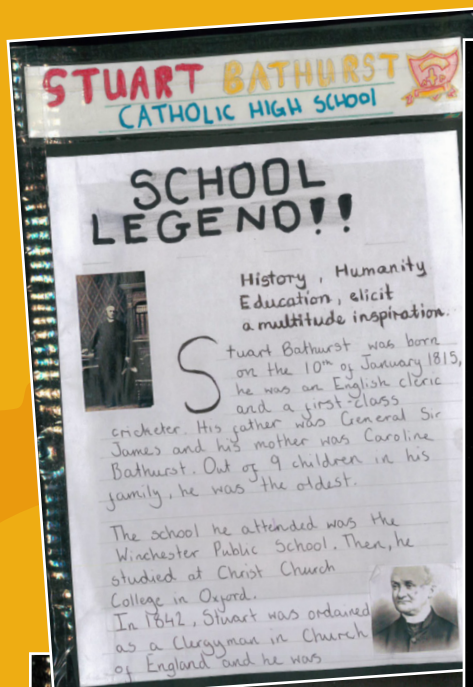
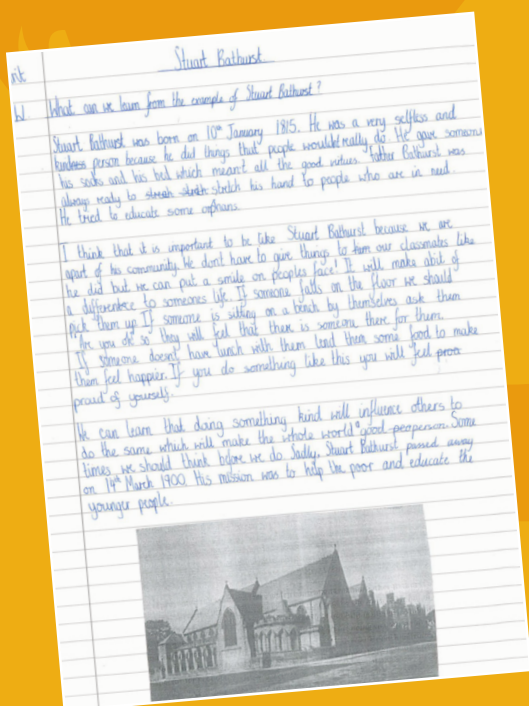

appointed rector of the parish of Kibworth in Leicestershire. He fully put himself into the life of the parish, he also appointed inspector of schools for the diocese. The promotion of education was heartfelt through out Stuart's life.

In the early 1850s, the Gorham Case finally convinced Stuart to leave the Church of England. He was baptised on the 28th of August by Father Newman, John Henry Newman: The Leader of the movement.

In Stuart's letters to Catherine, his sister, he wrote how joyful and happy he was when he became a Catholic and wanted her to become one too. When Catherine soon became a Catholic, she entered the Third Order of Saint Dominic.

Stuart then studied at Oscott College for the priest. In 1871 he became the parish priest at Saint Mary's Church.

Father Bathurst was always passionate to give a big hand to those who were helpless, he even gave his OWN BED to an ill person who was poor and had to sleep across 2 CHAIRS with a

Bathurst was moved to Aston near Stone and became the Diocesan Inspector for schools.

When he moved there, he lived in a small cottage. However, he had to move into a small room in the church tower because his housekeepers soon needed a place to live.

He remained in covent in Stone and helped the poor, educated the young and also converted a big amount of people to the faith.

He sadly passed away on the 14th of March 1900 and for 3 days, people from far distances to pay their biggest respects to him.

 "If you make your submission to God's Church you would receive such a gift. I cannot describe it to you... You will have all doubts vanish from you and shed tears of joy."

Stuart Bathurst grew up to be a kind-hearted, selfless person who would help others. He is also an inspirational person who can show people the right thing to do. But, he still cares about discipline from other people and that you need to be grateful about everything you have been given.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

It's that time of year again where communities will be enjoying celebrations including Halloween, Diwali and Bonfire night. These celebrations provide opportunities for us all to enjoy time with our families and friends.

Children and young people will break up from school this week and I want to remind you all to keep your child safe over this busy holiday period. The darker nights are now upon us, so do you know where your child is going, who they're with and what they're doing?

Fireworks provide wonderful entertainment when they are let off correctly at an organised display. They can, however, be very dangerous when used inappropriately. Remember that in order to buy fireworks you must be over the age of 18 and they can only be purchased from registered sellers. Please remind your child of this: any child or young person found in possession of, or letting off, fireworks in public will face legal action. They will also place themselves and members of the public in great danger.

Also, please be mindful of those vulnerable members of society who may be fearful at this time of year. I would ask you to ensure that your child does not cause unnecessary distress through their actions, whether by involving themselves in anti-social behaviour or associating with those engaging in such behaviour.

Any child or young person found to be involved in anti-social behaviour will face legal action.

I want to be clear that where legal action for anti-social behaviour is taken against any child, there may also be repercussions for parents/guardians and other members of the family.

Sandwell Police are very proud of our relationship with the young people of Sandwell and our wider communities. We encourage families to spend time with each other and enjoy this season of the year.

At the same time I would ask you, as parents/guardians, to ensure that the whole of Sandwell can enjoy this time together, and that the actions of a few do not spoil the enjoyment of many. If we all ensure our own child is safe, then we can be sure others are safe too.
