HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Welcome to our Newsletter

In this week's Gospel, Jesus delivers some fairly worrying news: "All that you see here, the days will come when there will not be left stone upon another stone, all of the stones will be thrown down". Those listening to him asked him when this would happen and how they could prepare and Jesus advises them to "beware" of those pretending to be him or that the time has come. He also makes the prediction that "one nation will rise against one another nation. And there will be earthquakes, famines and plagues". Does any of this sound familiar?

This is a worrying time for all of us with political insecurity in our own country and global issues such as famine and climate change and our young people feel the burden of these worries on a daily basis. What we need to take from this weeks liturgy is the encouragement of Jesus to "seek what will last" and in that, to seek what is good and loving.

This week our school remembered the fallen in a number of ways: by observing the two minute silence, and also by visiting the beautiful display in our new Learning Resource Centre. As teachers we come into contact with thousands of children. the vast majority of them go on to lead highly successful lives - having families and careers, holidays and Christmas. It is inevitable that we are also privileged to support families through the saddest times too and I always keep in my prayers the family of Fusilier Louis Carter, a member of my form group who was killed in action in

Afghanistan 10 years ago. Louis was killed going back in to rescue a fallen comrade who had been injured by an exploding landmine. All of this at the age of 18, the immense bravery he showed is humbling. At the time, he was the youngest soldier to lose his life in the conflict. I ask that you keep him and his family in your prayers too.

The past two weeks have been the first set of mocks for our Year 11 pupils. Their behaviour and application to the job at hand has been impressive and I want to thank them and you as parents for what seems to have been a very productive half term. I hope that the proof will be in the pudding and that when they receive the results of these exams, they will be encouraged to continue working hard to do and be of their best.

In terms of our journey forward being publicly recognised, there are two main vehicles; an OFSTED inspection, which we have no control over in terms of timing but realistically, the most obvious way is through the outcomes of our pupils being published and celebrated.

I am, as you know a mathematician and I genuinely love a good spreadsheet. This week I received a spreadsheet containing the Progress scores of every school in England. Also on there was the improvement in progress for every school. I searched our school and discovered that we are 240th in the country which admittedly doesn't sound that impressive initially but when I tell you there are approximately 3500 Secondary schools it starts to sound better.

I hope that you have noticed that I am keen to ensure that we gain our place as the best school in Sandwell in a number of ways. Most importantly by providing the quality of education that your child is entitled to through a strong culture of safeguarding, excellent teaching and a robust system of pastoral care. I believe we are certainly well on our way to this and would appreciate your feedback on what we are doing well and how we can be better.

To this end, we will be carrying out a parent survey over the next couple of weeks to gather your opinions. Please keep an eye out for a text or email with a link on it.

Doing a little number crunching told me that in fact we are in the top 7% of schools in the country using this measure – now that's impressive!

I'm going to end it there for this week, a proud headteacher who will continue to encourage and lead our community to better things, thankful for your continued support.


