Dear Parents/Carers,

We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Parent App



We've chosen Arbor to help us manage our school.

Arbor is a simple, smart and cloud-based MIS (Management Information System), which helps us work faster, smarter and more collaboratively as a school. The Parent App and Parent Portal mean we can keep you informed about your child's life at school in a much more accessible way. Log into Arbor to see and update your child's information, get live updates and make payments or bookings on the go!

The Parent Portal works on Google Chrome (computer or laptop) and you can download the Parent App from the App Store or Google Play Store on your phone (Android 5.0; iOS 10.0 and upwards).

How to get started

- 1. Wait for your welcome email from us telling you Arbor is ready you won't be able to log in before
- 2. Click the link in your welcome email to set up your password
- 3. Go to the App or Google Play Store on your phone and search 'Arbor'
- 4. Click 'Install' on Android or 'Get' on iPhone then open the App
- 5. Enter your email, select the school, then enter your password
- 6. Accept the Terms & Conditions and enter your child's birthday

Need help using Arbor

Contact the school office if you have questions about Arbor, the App or Parent Portal. Tell us the type and model of your phone, e.g. an iPhone SE, and include screenshots or screen recordings.

To safeguard student data in line with General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR), Arbor only works directly with schools.

Some tips to try:

- Ensure your username is the email address you use for Arbor. Ask us to check the email address linked to your account.
- 2. **Reset your password** from the login page, or ask us to do this.
- If the login email was sent to you more than 96 hours ago, the password link will have expired. Ask us to send it again.
- 4. Ask the school office to check that your email address has not been used twice e.g. on another guardian or child's profile.
- 5. Enter the birthday of one of your children to log in.
- 6. Only relatives who are **Primary Guardians** of a child can access the Arbor App. Ask us to check you can access Arbor.

ATTENDANCE AMAJOR KEY TO FUTURE SUCCESS

Dear Parent / Carer,

This is an important update about school attendance for the 2023-24 academic year. Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School is working in partnership with parents and the Local Authority to improve school attendance. A big thank you to the majority of parents who make sure their children attend school regularly, particularly during the current cost of living crisis impacting families. Your efforts, working in partnership with the school, will ensure that your child will have the best chance to achieve their academic potential and have real opportunity in further education and the world of work. It will also allow your child to;

- Access the lessons needed to achieve their expected grades
- Maintain friendships and develop new ones.
- Have access to social and sporting events offered by the school
- Explore potential careers
- Develop work habits such as good punctuality which are essential to thrive in the world of employment.

How does your child compare?



Attendance during school year	Equals this number of days absent	Which is approximately this many weeks absent	Which means this number of lessons missed

If you are worried about your child's attendance the first port of call is to discuss your concerns with the school directly.

It may be tempting to book a family holiday in term time to save costs during the cost of living crisis. However, now is not the time for children to miss any more school. Family holidays in term time are not allowed in law. Taking children on leave without applying for authorisation may mean the school has to report your child as 'missing' to the local authority and holidays cannot be authorised retrospectively in law. Adding even more absence to the time children have missed because of school closures during the covid years means that the children miss even more lessons that will not be repeated.

Family emergencies also need careful consideration. It is not always appropriate or in the best interest of the child to miss school for emergencies which are being dealt with by adult family members. Notifying the school of leave due to a family emergency does not mean that it will be authorised.

Please note that where parents fail to ensure their child attends school regularly, legal action, including penalty notices, may be considered.

LEARNING REVIEW UPDATE

As part of a carefully sequenced curriculum students at Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School will be regularly assessed by teachers using a variety of different strategies. One aspect of these is learning review windows. These give teachers the opportunity to assess students' progress, generating information which can inform their future teaching. Please find below the schedule of learning review windows in the academic year 2023/24 including parent's evening dates.

In the lead up to learning review windows students will receive information regarding the nature of the assessments they will be sitting, topics they will need to revise as well as timetable for these assessments and strategies to support their revision.

Following the learning review windows teachers will use the assessment information to identify future steps for learning and any students they feel would benefit from additional support.

Reports will also be issued to parents summarising these assessments, alongside information regarding students' attendance and attitude to learning.

Further information regarding this will follow during the academic year.

Please be aware that due to the nature of some subjects' additional assessments may take place during the year, alongside external public examinations which will be notified separately.

This term, the English Department has been pleased with how well students have settled into their lessons and for the progress that they have been making. We hope that they will continue to show such great focus during their next stage of their learning journey (see below).



YEAR

7

Year 7 have travelled back in time and are currently visiting Ancient Greece where the exploration of Greek Mythology is their current focus. Year 7s have been working really hard to deepen their understanding of myths through the analysis of allegorical messages behind ancient myths, characters, archetypes, context and links to current society. Well done Year 7, you are all working extremely hard!

YEAR

8

Year 8 have been studying A Midsummer Night's Dream - reading through the Shakespearean English version of the text and developing their understanding of more challenging vocabulary. Students are able to remember events from throughout the play and are enthusiastically engaging with reading as a class. Students are learning to write analytically about a text, write creatively using prompts and to also be able to communicate ideas through spoken debates. Students will soon be moving onto Romantic Poetry and are looking forward to studying a new type of text.

YEAR

9

During the Autumn term, Year 9 have delved into the dark and strange Gothic genre, and the futuristic world of Dystopian fiction. They have been reading extracts from famous stories such as Frankenstein, The Hunger Games and The Fall of the House of Usher. Using the knowledge that they have learned, there have been various opportunities to write their own Gothic story as well as descriptions of Dystopian worlds. There has been a lot of great work so far Year 9, keep it up!

YEAR

10

In Year 10, students have been hard at work studying A Christmas Carol for their English Literature studies, and have also been learning the skills for English Language Paper 1 in English Language lessons. Learners have engaged with exam style questions in class to demonstrate the skills that they have been taught. Year 10 have shown that they are dedicated to their learning and have produced some great responses in class discussion. As Year 10 prepare for their LRW1 assessment we have great faith that they will do well and have confidence in their ability to 'do and be of their best.'

YEAR

11

Year 11 have been looking at developing skills for English Language – they have looked at both reading and writing skills in preparation for their recent LRW1 assessments. They have also read Romeo and Juliet this term and are moving on to looking at unseen poetry, which is the final section of their GCSE in English Literature. Over the next few months, we know that our students will want to continue to improve as they make their way towards their final exams in May/June.

YEAR

Year 12 have been fully immersed in the wonderful world of William Shakespeare through their exploration of one of his most famous plays: Othello. With themes such as marriage, betrayal, comradery and sisterhood, year 12 have been kept on their toes with their analysis of Shakespeare's tragic play. Good luck to all of year 12 in their up and coming mock exams. Following the theme of Love Through the Ages, they have explored a range of poetry.

YEAR

13

Year 13 have been closely analysing Carol Ann Duffy's modern poetry collection 'Feminine Gospels'; exploring themes of female oppression, unity and rewriting existing traditions. Alongside this, they have also been studying Jeanette Winterson's novel 'Oranges are not the only fruit'. The Y13 exam asks students to make comparisons between the two texts, with the overarching theme between them being: modern times. They have looked at the final section of their course by examining unseen prose.

Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gold, incense, and myrrh gifts.

LITERACY AND READING

MISS JOHNSTON

At Stuart Bathurst Catholic High School, reading and literacy is a massive focus for us as we want to get the best results from our students and reading is the way to start this! As such we have launched a number of new initiatives in school this year: Sparx Reader for Key Stage 3, Reading Ambassadors, Reading Buddies, Book Club, a new Book of the Month shelf in the library, and Creative Writing Club. These are just the start of the new initiatives we plan to implement throughout this year and beyond!

Sparx Reader

Sparx Reader is a fantastic programme that the school has been lucky enough to be chosen to participate in! We are part of the trial schools that are accessing Sparx Reader and allowing our students to read a variety of literature and texts for completely FREE! Students are able to log into Sparx Reader on their phones, tablets and laptops and have access to a huge range of texts tailored to a student's reading ability. They can earn a Gold Membership, purely by reading lots, and can have access to an unlimited range of texts at any time when they feel like reading. Form tutors set each student in Key Stage 3 thirty minutes across the week - which breaks down to 6 minutes each school day to hit that goal! Any extra reading they do outside school will massively help to improve their reading comprehension and fluency for GCSE.

Reading Ambassadors have been launched across the whole school, with almost 30 ambassadors signing up to promote a love of reading to their school. These ambassadors range from Year 7 all the way up to Year 13. It's been fantastic to see the level of passion that the students have towards reading and want to champion it around school.

"Reading to me is really important because it is a great skill to develop – 80% of what we see we also read, especially as young students. Reading is what everyone should have access to, but sadly not everyone does. My role as a Reading Ambassador is to show everybody in the school that reading is fun and we can all access reading through Sparx Reader for free! HISTORY

MR JONES

The Autumn Term has been really exciting for the History Department. We have implemented and cemented new concepts and the students have approached their learning in a different way. Year 7 have been introduced to a number of key concepts such as Cause and Consequence and Significance when exploring Britain before 1066. Year 8 have developed their understanding of key concepts. They have developed their significance skills when studying about how the British Empire should be remembered. Year 9 have had the unique opportunity to learn about the near annihilation of the world which the Cold War. The key concepts they are instilling are Cause and Consequence. Year 10 have consolidated their source and similarity and difference skills when exploring Medieval and Renaissance medicine. Year 11 have been making links with concepts by learning about the Interwar Years Finally, Year 12 and 13 have developed their understanding of validity of sources whilst diving deeper into the world of academic History through Historiography in their NEA and Russian unit.

There has been an emphasis on reading and literacy this half term with disciplined reading being adopted in lessons to support in students understanding of events and moments in History and how it coincides with concepts. Special mention to 10AHi1 whose reading was noticed by visitors and some work made its way on the Stuart Bathurst X (formerly Twitter) page.

UPCOMING TOPICS:

Year 7 are getting the opportunity the aftermath of the Battle of Hastings by exploring how William consolidated his power. They will look at the barbarity and control that William used to achieve consolidation.

Year 8 will explore the Industrial Revolution. They will determine the impact of the social and political impact the Industrial Revolution had on Britain and how this subsequently led to the First World War.

Year 9 will have the unique opportunity by exploring the Civil Right Movement in America. They will learn how African Americans were viewed after World War Two to the protagonists who instigated change for the lives of African Americans.

Year 10 will continue learning about Health and the People with the focus turning to the 20th Century. They will explore the work of Crick and Watson and other key aspects of Medicine which changed the way people think about causes, treatments and preventions of illness.

Year 11 will start their last topic on Germany between 1871 and 1945. They will study the birth of a unified Germany and explain the political, economic and social aims amongst the problems that came up after unification.

Year 12 Students will explain why Nicholas II became the last Tsar in Imperialist Russia and how he amongst the previous Tsars actions lead to an appetite for revolution in Russia. Also, they will be learning how Harold Wilson became Prime Minister of the United Kingdom in 1964 and the issues of the Labour Party after his election win.

Year 13 students will explore the reign of Nikita Khrushchev. They will determine why he introduced the De-Stalinisation programme and the impact of this on his reign. They will also explore how Tony Blair was able to win a general election and the problems he and Labour faced after 1997.



ART/TECHNOLOGY MRS LONGMORE-SPILLETT


It's been busy in the Art and Technology departments over the last term.

Year 11 have extra curricular lessons on a Tuesday and Thursday afterschool as they prepare their final designs for their personal portfolio.








